BIG IDEA: Colossians 2:16-23

You are free in Christ – don't be judged by human rules.

Here Paul gives us insight into the sort of 'hollow and deceptive philosophies' or false ideas (from 2v8) the Colossians were facing.

The Colossians were being judged by the false teachers (who said they needed more than Jesus) for not following their rules.


Paul shows them why these false ideas are wrong.



COLOSSIANS

Old Testament festivals - v16-17

Old Testament festivals were God-given and good!
But they were for the time before Jesus died and rose.



Another way to think of it is that the OT festivals were **signposts** to Jesus. Once Jesus is there, we don't need the signposts!

Visions of angels - v18-19

God can speak to people in visions even today. He can do whatever he wants! But his <u>usual</u> way of communicating with us is through his word, the Bible. The Bible is special because it's inspired by the Holy Spirit - God himself. So when a Christian, who is filled with the Holy Spirit, reads it, they are hearing from God. God actually speaks through the Bible! The Bible isn't second-class to visions.



But sometimes people do seem to follow human rules. What's that about?!

We're free to live, but we're not free to sin. For example, someone might make a rule for themselves not to be in a particular WhatsApp group chat because they find it tempting to join in with gossip when in that group. But that 'rule' doesn't apply to every Christian and it doesn't mean that WhatsApp's completely bad. If we had a rule at Highfields that no one should be in a WhatsApp group at all, that would be a rule that we've just made up and it would have no value in making us less sinful – it would be the sort of rule that Paul is warning against in verses 20-23. It would be bad. **No rule will ever make us sin free – only Jesus can do that.**

The big thing Paul wants us to remember is (v16) "do not let anyone judge you".
